

Pupil Premium Report 2019 (Including Year 7 Literacy and Numeracy Catch Up funding*)

Overview

The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011, and paid by means of a specific grant for pupils registered as eligible for Free School Meals in the last 6 years and currently in Y7 to Year 11 or those who are looked after by the Local Authority. A premium was also introduced for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces. The Pupil Premium will be used by this school to address any underlying inequalities in educational experiences and to bring about academic progress for pupils in receipt of Pupil Premium funding that is as high as those without.

Objectives

- The Pupil Premium will be used to provide additional educational support to improve the progress and to raise the standard of achievement for these pupils
- The funding will be used to narrow and close the gap between the achievement of these pupils and their peers
- As far as its powers allow, the school will use the funding to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible for Pupil Premium and others. We will ensure that the funding reaches the pupils who need it most and that it makes a significant impact on their education and lives.

School Policy

The Head teacher and governing body have agreed a policy for Pupil Premium to guide the use of funds and to ensure that it represents value for money.

Statistics

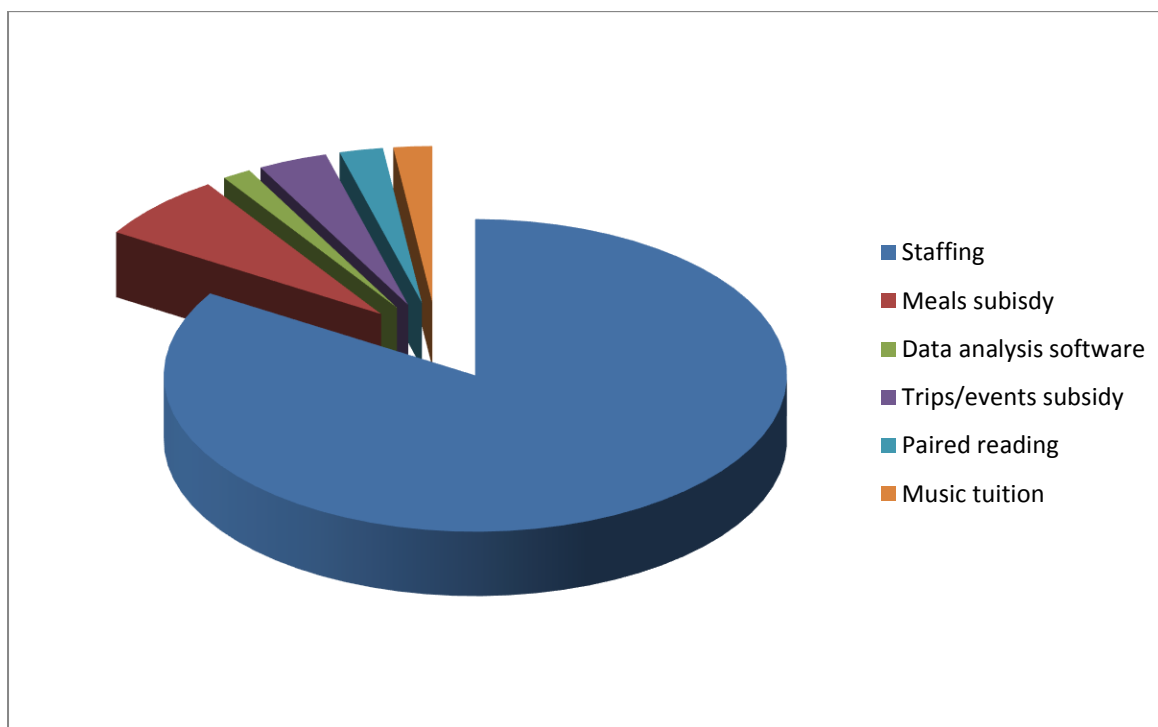
- In 2018-2019 the school received the sum of £227, 579 based on 228 students being eligible to attract Pupil Premium funding and £1,625 for the Year 7 Catch-Up Premium funding.

Strategies 2018 - 2019

The school has identified the needs of those pupils receiving pupil premium funding and we have decided to use the following intervention strategies:

- *Providing smaller class sizes across the school where possible*
- *Providing Peer tutoring: trained Y12 pupils work with selected Y7 pupils on a peer reading programme*
- *Providing a Y11 mentoring project focussing on identified underachieving Y11 pupils as indicated through our tracking system*
- *Providing a Learning Mentor to work with pupils identified through the inclusion meetings as needing more one to one or small group support to focus on overcoming barriers to learning*
- *Providing assistance with the Year 7 language trip, German and Spanish exchange trips and other overseas opportunities at a subsidy of 50% per identified pupil*
- *Providing subsidised places at other trips during the year for identified pupils*
- *Providing subsidised music lessons for identified pupils*
- *Providing a homework club available to KS3 and KS4 students*
- *Reviewing strategies to support progress of Pupil Premium pupils in Mathematics*
- *Providing extra PE coaches to enhance the extra-curricular offer at KS3 and 4*
- *Providing emergency funding for students for uniform, travel and lunches*
- *Focusing on effective feedback to all Pupil Premium pupils*
- *Including PPI on seating plans to highlight the pupils for our teaching and feedback*
- *Working in departments to share effective strategies to improve progress of Pupil Premium students*

Evidence of impact: Year 11 pupils 2018-2019

Attainment

There were 45 Year 11 disadvantaged students in receipt of Pupil Premium funding in 2019. The percentage of GCH disadvantaged students achieving the headline measure of grades 4+ in English and Maths was **82.2%**, compared with **94.4%** of non-disadvantaged students who achieved grades 4+ in English and Maths.

The percentage of GCH disadvantaged students achieving the headline measure of grades 5+ in English and Maths was **62.2%**, compared with **77.6%** of non-disadvantaged students who achieved grades 5+ in English and Maths.

This year, the percentage of grades at 9, 8 and 7 for disadvantaged students was **35.0%**, compared to non-disadvantaged of **50.3%**. However again, GCH disadvantaged students comfortably exceeded the 2018 national figure for grades at 9-7 of 21.9%.

Progress 8

An Attainment 8 score of 58.81 for disadvantaged students represents a 5+ grade average across an approved list of 8 GCSE subjects. This is higher than for all students nationally in 2019 (46.5). Our Progress 8 result of +0.85 for disadvantaged students has exceeded our target and surpassed our figure of +0.76 for all students. The Progress 8 for non-disadvantaged nationally in 2018 was +0.13.

EBACC

44.4% of Pupil Premium students at The Grey Coat Hospital achieved the English Baccalaureate at Grades 9 to 5 compared with 63.6% of all students.

*Year 7 Literacy and Numeracy Catch Up premium
