COURSE DESCRIPTION

At the heart of Economics is one question: how should we allocate our resources to cater for the needs of over 7 billion people? The answer is complex. If you choose Economics at The Grey Coat Hospital you will consider a broad range of questions – in one lesson you could be analysing UK drug policy, the next having a debate about the impact of Brexit. Over the course of these lessons you will develop both your quantitative and qualitative skills, making this a desired qualification by universities and employers. More than this, you will find yourself looking at the world in a different way, understanding why various agents act in the way they do, and perhaps changing the way you respond.

EXAMINATION RESULTS

In 2024: 32% of students achieved A* - A
76% of students achieved A* - B
88% of students achieved A* - C

In 2024 44% of students progressed to Finance/Economics/Business/Management related degrees.

ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES

Economists from the Ministry of Justice have come into A-Level economics lessons, giving practical tips on economic analysis and how to enter the profession. Talks and networking opportunities have been arranged for the students with various members of the professional services; we have spent an hour with the CEO of a top Management Consultancy who gave out his business card before we left. We have also taken part in student conferences, and were privileged to be invited to a lecture led by



former Governor of the Bank of England, Mark Carney, who fielded questions from our students on economic issues.

The Institute for Fiscal Studies found that Economics graduates had the third highest median annual earnings five years after graduating – only surpassed by Medicine and Dentistry.
