COURSE DESCRIPTION

A level History at GCH covers a broad range of study, encompassing the history of England, South Africa and Russia and including study of social, political, economic and cultural history. It takes students through momentous changes in England in the medieval and early modern periods, through the impact of colonialism in South Africa, right up to the global impact on the modern world of the events and consequences of the Russian Revolution. A full overview of the content and assessment of the course is provided overleaf. If you enjoy studying the past and debating issues, then you will very much enjoy this course. In comparison with GCSE History, it offers far greater depth of study and development of student expertise in the areas of study.

EXAMINATION RESULTS

History A Level exam results at The Grey Coat Hospital are outstanding. In 2024, 55% of GCH students achieved A*-A grades, 81% achieved A*-B and 98% achieved A*-C. These figures are far above national averages, particularly at the higher end: our students are over twice as likely to attain A*-A grades as their peers nationally.



ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES

In the past, we have run very popular sixth-form residential trips in conjunction with the Art Department. We are currently planning new trips more closely linked to our reformed A-Level courses: potential destinations include Edinburgh and York. Trips to support the curriculum are also organised to the National Gallery and National Archives and there is an opportunity to attend a conference on Russia and its Rulers with talks by eminent historians. Sixth form students support younger students by helping with KS3 History Club and mentoring GCSE students. We also have an active Senior History Society. Members explore topics outside of the curriculum, present on their own areas of interest, plan our Black History Month programme, invite external speakers, and run the school History Magazine.

FUTURE CAREERS

There is a great deal of support for students who might want to study history at university at GCH. We regularly advertise and promote a range of university taster days, lectures, open days and summer schools. We provide reading lists and help with writing personal statements. We take students interested in studying history at university on a trip to Oxford University to visit two colleges and attend seminars run by history tutors. We also run specific Oxbridge preparation sessions and mock interviews. Over the last five years, 7 of our students have taken up places to study history at either Oxford or Cambridge.



The Guardian newspaper recently reported on the fact that “History graduates are found in disproportionate numbers on the boards of the UK’s top 100 companies.” The report found that “the most frequently mentioned advantages history graduates displayed were the ability to read quickly and effectively and process large amounts of information, think deeply about a subject, develop cogent arguments and communicate clearly.” Studying History at A Level opens doors to a huge range of future courses and careers.
